Online FMD Emergency Preparation Course

Course Run: February 18 – March 14, 2025

This virtual course aims to prepare

veterinarians, veterinary technicians and technologists, and industry members

for detecting and responding to FMD in the event of its arrival into Canada.

After completing this course, participants will have increased knowledge of how to:

- 1. Diagnose FMD through clinical and laboratory examination;
- 2. Conduct an epidemiological enquiry for FMD;
- 3. Enter and leave infected premises in a biosecure manner to prevent the potential introduction and spread of FMD virus; and
- 4. Advise livestock owners on the control measures involved in regaining FMD-free status.
